NEW MEMBERS



TRANSPORT

On the plus side we will be arranging transport in and around Townsville, for most of the functions. Full details of pick up points etc will be advised closer to the reunion.

On the minus side, we may have to pay for some of the transport, but it will be kept to a minimum.

Notes:

 Tue and Wed may be changed around to fit in with the Regiment badges for each of the units vehicles. All this took place even before approval was given on 7 July 1965 to number the new Battery '107' when it was formed.

Finally on the 1st August 1965 authority was granted for the raising of 107th Field Battery, to be completed by 1 Sep 1965. This of course presented no problems as 107 Field Battery was now already operational. In fact 107 Field Battery moved to Tianjara on 2nd August 1965 for its first exercise and fired its first round for 22 years on 8 August 1965. The original and the present 107th Battery had some interesting links. The first BC's of both the old and new 107th Batteries were both killed in action, MAJ C.H. Patterson DSO at Ploegsteert Wood, Belgium on 14 April 1917 and MAJ P.J. Badcoe VC in Huong Tra province SVN on 7 April 1967 while serving with the Australian Army Training Team. MAJ I. Marfell DSO who succeeded MAJ Patterson remained as BC of the 107th Field Battery until the Battery returned to Australia in 1919. His sword and Sam Browne which he wore in France was presented to the BC of 107 Battery by Geoff Johnson who used them in service with the 7th Brigade C.M.F. in the post-war years of the 1920's. The sword and Sam Browne remains in the possession of each succeeding Battery Commander. Finally, the loose links between the original and re-formed batteries are reinforced by the annual competition for the Black Sheep Cup. cup was originally won by 107 Bty in France in 1917 and fifty years later, after being re-named the 'Black Sheep Cup' was won by the right section of 107 Battery in the first annual competition. After re-forming the Battery spent most of December 1965 and January 1966 on various exercises at TIANJARA.

1st Field Regiment was to go Vietnam but 107 Battery was to be left behind. The Battery was stripped of all eligible soldiers and by May 1966 had been reduced to 1 Officer and 20 Other Ranks. The remainder of that year was taken up in accumulating stores and personnel and in training so that the Battery would be capable of participating in exercise "Barra-Winga" which was held at Shoalwater Bay. It was on this exercise that the current sub-units of 4 Field Regiment served together for the first time. 107 Battery was placed under command of 4 Field Regiment which for the exercise consisted of an RHQ and 108 Field Battery bolstered by 104 Medium Battery to achieve a three battery regiment.

1967 was a very important year for the Battery. March saw the Battery taking part in the Staff College demonstration followed by exercises and courses in April and May, but it was on the open day staged on 17th of June that was the climax of the year. It was at this open day that the 'Black Sheep' of 107 Field Battery became the 'Rampant Ram' of today. Major Marfell's Sam Browne and sword were presented and the annual competition for the Black Sheep Cup was started. After the running of a Battery Jungle Warfare course and participation in exercise "Noisy Pitta" with 8 BAR at Shoalwater Bay, the advance party left for Malaysia on the 1st of September to be followed by the main body who relieved A Battery on the 16th September 1967.

Wednesday 8th May:

On the enclosed return, we're asked for rank and ECN /Trade you performed while in SVN. Today we are in the hands of the Regiment, so be prepared. Can the FO/FO Acks remember their drills? Can the layers remember the sequence of lay? Will Tim Makinson remember his red pen? It will be an early start, and no wives or children today I'm afraid. We SHOULD be home by dark!!

Friday 10th May:

Farewell bar b que at the "Seaview Hotel".
Timings TBA but it will be around 1200 hrs, concluding about 1600 hrs. There will be a chance to "soldier on" for those so inclined.

Tuesday 7th May:

Guests will include CO, RSM, and members of the Regiment Transport to and from will be provided. In selecting the venue, we have tried to stay middle of the road to keep costs within reason. Hopefully there will be a chance for a dance or two after dinner. At the dinner we will show our appreciation to the Regiment for looking after us. (see separate item).

1968 saw elements of the Battery training in Brunei, Vietnam and the East Coast of Malaya as well as the usual exercises at Asahan. The year was climaxed by the Brigade inter unit sports competition where the Battery seven a side rugby triumphed over all, including the Kiwis. One last ceremonial occasion of note occuredwhen the Battery held ground for the presentation of colours to 8 BAR in January 1969 the Battery Emplaning Officer lost his first vehicle when H1 was dropped from a Royal Malaysian Airforce Sikorsky helicopter somewhere in the jungle between Kluang and Kanga Kaharg. Not satisfied with this effort he managed to drop the replacement H1 from 400 feet during an exercise conducted in March 1969. Not even the Black Sheep Battery could mange three in a row, at least that was what people thought, but in May 1969, during trials with a Scout helicopter, parts of 'D' gun were jettisoned into the Malacca Straits. In spite of there 'minor' incidents 107 Field Battery left Malaysia with its good reputation enhanced to join 4th Field Regiment in TOWNSVILLE to prepare for the Battery's tour in Vietnam.

After intense training at High Range, the Jungle Training Centre and on exercise with 8 RAE, 107 Battery departed for SVN in May 1970. Very little is recorded of the Battery Tour in SVN, and this should be corrected. To this end, anyone with a story to tell is asked to put it down and provide it to me for inclusion in "4th Field Regiment in SVN" to be published "one day". Photos would also

be welcome.

RETURNS.

Would those attending please complete the enclosed form and return it to me as soon as you can. Most bookings have now been made, but it is never too late to put your name down. Whether it be a photo album of the Regiment in SVN, or some sort of trophy, all suggestions or ideas are most welcome. I feel at this stage we could spend up to \$300.00, and plan to make the presentation during the association dinner.

THE HISTORY OF 107TH FIELD BATTERY "THE BLACK SHEEP OF THE RAA"

Battery was first raised in Sydeney in 1915 as 28 Battery as part of the newly formed 7th Field Artillery Brigade, which also comprised 25th, 26th and 27th Batteries. After initial training in the rudiments of military discipline, the Brigade had a farewell march through the streets of Sydney, before leaving their base at "THE WARREN" MARRICKVILLE at 0300 hrs on the 11th of May 1916. The Brigade moved by tram burdened by the necessities of greatcoat, bandolier, rifle, and kitbag to the Quay where they embarked at 0600 hrs on board the SS 'ARGYLLSHIRE! After 63 days of living under cramped conditions steaming without lights and with only brief stopa at Durban, Capetown and Dakar the Brigade arrived in England on the 12 July 1916 and was moved immediately to the Training Camp at Larkhill.

During the next four months of intensive training the Brigade was transformed into an efficient fighting until ready to go to France as the Artillery of the famous 3rd Division A.I.F. under the command of General Sir John Monash. The Brigades first introduction to warfare was in the allegedly quiet section of Armentieres where they met the famous Madammoiselle; this was followed by twelve months in Flanders at such places as Zillebeke, Ypres, Ploegsteert Woods, Pascherdale, Hell Five Corner, Messines, Dickenbusch and Mennin Gate. Then there was the forced march in 1918 from Bailleul to Doullens where 85 miles of terrible roads were covered in 100 hours as the call came to stem the German breakthrough in the Somme. This was followed by the experiences of Armiens, Villiers Brettennearix, Bray Perone and Bullecourt. At the end of the war 107 Battery had 181 all ranks to celebrate the Armistace after having lost 60 killed in action of whom 41 were gassed, 12 died of wounds, 1 died of illness and 119 were wounded.

On returning from France in 1919 the Battery became part of the 7th Field Regiment located first at North Sydney and later at Willoughby NSW where it remained till 1939. In that year 107 Battery was sent to Geraldton WA as part of the 8th Brigade Group. In 1942 the four 4.5 inch guns were replaced by 25 pounders. Although the Battery was on active service conditions it did not see action in World War 2. The last official act of 107th Field Battery was to march through Sydney on the 29 October 1943 before being disbanded in November of 1943. On 1st of June 1965 LTCOL R.M. C. Cubis, CO of 1st Field Regiment requested authority from RAA 1 DIV to raise an additional Battery. During the initial stages of the formation it was felt that the Battery should have a suitable emblem that would in part reflect the nature of the unit. Since the Battery was being raised from 'resources' not considered essential to other established units in the area, members of the battery felt like 'poor relations' in a setting where other units were preparing for service in South Vietnam. With this situation in mind the Black Sheep was adopted as the Battery emblem. A metal sign depicting a very sad looking black merino ram was produced on the front of the Battery area along with
