The 15th (Victorian) Brigade was decimated in fifteen minutes The 53rd fought well; some were Kangaroo Marchers. Tom Baker, Harry Fleming and Will Harden have their names upon that Wall. It is difficult to contemplate the horror of war It is even more difficult to contemplate the senseless waste of young men's lives Never forget those who never again saw, the 19th of July.
