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# 12 Field Regiment (Vietnam) Association

#### INFORMATION BULLETIN No. 39 11/10/15

Our esteemed Welfare Officer Rick Cranna is currently enjoying himself overseas. At this stage, we are not missing him too much because fortunately this is the first issue of the Bulletin for some time which does not report the death of one of our artillery mates! #### 1. New Member:

We are delighted to welcome Barrie Williams as a new member. Barrie served as a Lance Bombardier in Vietnam through 1968 and into 1969 with 1 Australian Reinforcement Unit, 4 Field Regiment, and 12 Field Regiment. He lives in Surry Hills, NSW, but like Graham and Alan Floyd, he was originally from the great Victorian town of Ouyen, which produced a disproportionate number of soldiers for the Vietnam war, as this summary from Flood describes:

I thought I would inform you all of the "Ouven influence" re SVN:

- a. Cpl Frank Smith 1RAR KIA 21 Sep 65, the 2nd Australian soldier KIA. Interred at Terendak Cemetery and is to be repatriated Jun 2016 back to Ouyen;
- b. 14 young men from Ouven served in SVN;
- c. another 3 young men who were educated at the Ouyen High School also served in SVN;
- d. in 1968 there were 10 young men from Ouyen in SVN at the same time; and
- e. 3 sets of brothers with the "Ouyen influence" went to SVN.

That about covers it, and in a twist of fate at the Battle of Nui Le 21 Sep 71, exactly 6yrs after Frank was KIA, Ouyen had a survivor!

All in all a pretty good effort from a small country town! Flood.

## 8. Project to Support the Orphanage in Vietnam:

Last issue of this Bulletin contained information about an orphanage in Vietnam and the assistance it gets from a few dedicated members of our Association. There was also a plea for members to donate funds to help with the work being done there – in particular, help to purchase a much-needed mini-bus for the transport of children to medical appointments etc.

The response from you – our members – has been very gratifying and several thousand dollars has been raised to date through your generosity. However, they are still well short of their target, so if any of you are thinking of donating, I'm sure it would be greatly appreciated.

Ian Dimond has sent us the following report on the orphanage's activities, written by My Huong Le who manages the facility.

Hello Ian, News for Long Hai Centre.

The new school year at Long Hai Centre opened on the 7th September. This year we have increased from 132 to 150 children. Motorbike repair and sewing training are going very well, with some new students learning these skills. We are having problems hiring a hair salon training teacher (because of the low salary we are offering), but are hopeful to find the right person. 4 of our most qualified girls from the hair salon training program have found employment in this field. 8 of our children in the sewing training program also found employment and are now earning incomes to be able to support themselves and help their families.

New equipment such as hairdressing chairs are needed in the salon room before the next lot of children can join the program. In June the kitchen was renovated which we are so happy about and now older girls will have an opportunity to learn cooking.

A new program for the 18 children who are mentally affected in the special class at Long Hai Centre will begin to use a computer program called Duo Dulinex in October. This program has recently been translated into Vietnamese and has proven to be most beneficial for mentally handicap children in other countries. This will be the first time the program is implemented in Vietnam.

The Vung Tau Centre has closed, and all the children transferred to the new Centre 2 months ago. The new Centre is 7km from Vung Tau town. It is massive new building which was built by the government. It is 3 times larger than the former Vung Tau orphanage, but the move has come with many challenges and there are now more needs than ever. Security is a big problem with thieves breaking in of a night and since the move 5 boys have run away, jumping over the fence of a night. The walls are low and the surrounding area is very large. This will be very costly to secure the surrounding building with

wiring. There are also many other practical problems which need to be fixed, such as needing blinds to keep the sun out and many more fans are needed throughout the building. The building is very hot and there is no sea breeze like we had at the old Centre. The building was given unfurnished so most of the rooms are empty. All the old furniture was moved from the old Centre, but much of it was old and broken so was left behind.

More than anything though the children feel isolated at the new Centre and can not go to the park or beach as they used to. It is my dream to set up some new programs such as an art room, library/games room, music room and to have more sports equipment so that children can be kept busy and entertained. For sure if children are happy, then they will not run away. Never before have we had this problem to that degree, so it is definitely indicative that the boys feel bored and isolated. Anyway, I feel sad for those that have left as I know how hard life on the streets is for them and more often than not they turn to drugs. It is very sad because those boys were doing really well at our Centre prior to the move. Ian knew all these boys and can testify to the fact that they were well adjusted and happy prior to the move. There are of course some positives to the move in the very fact that we now have much more space and there is huge potential to open more programs to benefit the children given the space we now have. In the future I would also like to see a sewing training program at Vung Tau Centre as we have at Long Hai Centre.
