## National Artillery Museum at North Fort, North Head:

I have reproduced a Letter sent to me by Ian Taylor in regard to North Fort. It is self explanatory.

Moves at North Head

Dear Gunners and Friends

I am writing to inform you all of recent activities concerning the Australian Army Artillery Museum (AAAM) and Army's presence at North Fort. As you are aware the North Head Sanctuary (NHS), which includes the former North Head Barracks and the North Fort area, is now "owned" by the Sydney Harbour Federation Trust (SHFT). The AAAM and the artillery collection at North Head are tenants on the site.

Over recent years the SHFT has developed a management plan for NHS in consultation with many others, including a range of submissions by the Army and the RAAHC. The Trust's management plan recognizes the historical links that the military have had at North Head through the School of Artillery, the various defence fortifications and tunnels, the national Artillery Museum, the Defence of Sydney Monument and the Memorial Walkway. The plan also acknowledges that a museum that tells the story of the defence of Sydney Harbour and the military history of the site may qualify for a long-term lease at North Head. The Trust's Management Plan for the NHS was adopted on 3 September.

The CEO SHFT has now written to the Head Army History Unit (AHU) outlining future conditions and requirements for the site. This includes from February 2011, when the Trust plans to open the refurbished Café at North Fort, a request for public access to all areas 7 days a week. SHFT has also requested that Defence enter into a 10 year commercial lease agreement.

The conditions advised by the CEO SHFT to the AHU are considered unacceptable to Army, who are particularly concerned at the security of the collection at North Fort and the associated personal and public liability created by uncontrolled public access. Army is therefore proposing to vacate the site in 2011 and to transfer the AAAM initially to a storage facility, probably at Bandiana, and eventually to a new army museum facility to be built at Puckapunyal. This would accord with present Army policy, which is to locate Corps museums adjacent to Corps Schools. This was previously considered when the School of Artillery moved to Puckapunyal in 1997 but for a variety of reasons linked to the history of site and the links to Sydney this did not occur, and until now the AAAM has been well maintained at North Fort with the support of the RAA Historical Company and the North Fort volunteers.

On 2<sup>nd</sup> December the Head AHU, Roger Lee, briefed the AAAM staff, North Fort Volunteers and the RAAHC on the situation. The Army position has been advised to SHFT and negotiation has commenced.

The RAA Regimental Committee and the RAAHC Board will need to closely monitor, and influence where possible, the development of this situation. A process to clarify the ownership of the wide range of items in the artillery collection at North Head has commenced between the AHU and the RAAHC. It is anticipated that those items that should appropriately be in the AAAM will be loaned by the RAAHC to the AAHU. Other items owned by the RAAHC would be distributed to where most appropriate. This would include consideration for some to remain at North Fort where agreed by the SHFT, and some being given to other Army, national, regional and local museums and organisations where they have a close historical

association with items or can best care for them.

I will keep you informed as the situation develops. The next step will be to see how SHFT (and the Government) responds to the Army proposal. Both the RAA Regimental Committee and the RAAHC Board will be considering options and plans over the next 3 months. We are looking for a solution that will be best for the RAAHC and Regiment in the long term and will best maintain our history and heritage. We encourage the constructive support of all Gunners and friends through this process, and encourage the continued support and assistance of our volunteers both during the next few months and as long-term supporters of the RAAHC and the Regiment.

Earlier this year I had a TURP (rebore) – no cancer involved, but it took a few months to get over and I withdrew from anything that involved more than a couple of hours. Had 3 trips to hospital and a resupply of blood before it settled down. I think I became what some might call "a miserable bleeder" (Some may still think I am).

As you may have heard on the grapevine, the RAA Historical Company is being revamped to reflect its National Aims, rather than being North Fort and Australian Army Artillery Museum Centric. A change in Army History Unit Policy and procedures has brought about the need to re-launch the RAAHC in a revised role. The RAAHC will still support the Museum via the website <u>www.northfort.org.au</u> for the time being. Those who are interested should watch the website for changes, which reflect the new regime. I will continue to be the Webmaster for the time being.

Apart from that, Carolyn and I have bought a house in Willoughby, about 3km as the crow flies from where we are now as we are upsizing to accommodate family on what is currently a five-year plan. We settle on that 17<sup>th</sup> Dec 2010 and main move is 20<sup>th</sup> Dec. We have sold the Townhouse at Reynolds St. Cremorne and will settle that in early January 2011. By the time you read this we should be well on the way, barring any unforeseen circumstances.

Apart from the stress of throwing out, or packing into storage, 21 years of accumulated stuff and the questionable knees and hips, I am in reasonable shape.

Barry and Sue West's News: -

Rellies, friends and colleagues, lend me your ears (with apologies to Will Shakespeare),

A few of you have asked for another update, so with my fingers locked to the keyboard, here goes. The last review I had was in mid September (and which briefly reported on) and the next one is not due until the end of November. Apparently the Haematologist needs to allow some time for the various drugs to do their thing, and hence give a better indication on how the treatment is working (or not working I presume?). Anyway, in the meantime, I continue to bombard my system with Thalidomide, steroids and various antibiotics. As I mentioned in my previous email (which most of you would have seen) I changed my pain relief drugs and that has had a marked effect on my general wellbeing, eating, etc for the better. My previous pain relief drug was a derivative of Oxychodone and if anyone watched Four Corners on the ABC a

few weeks ago, you would have seen that Oxychodone has a number of very unpleasant side effects, as well as being used by drug addicts as a cheap and more readily available form of Morphine. I'm happy not to be on it anymore, as I can vouch for its unpleasant side effects at least. I also still make regular trips to the hospital on a monthly basis for a "Zameta" infusion. What that is, is a chemo infusion (which I will have to have every month till my time is up), which can best be described as putting araldite into my bones to strengthen them - seeing as the cancer I have eats away the inside of my bones, weakening them (hence why I had part of my right humerus removed and replaced with a chromium prosthesis way back in June.

As mentioned, since mid September my general wellbeing and consequently my mobility has improved markedly. I can now walk short distances without the need for a walking stick, although I still use a wheelchair if there is any distance to travel, as I get some pain in my back as a result of the nerve damage at the base of the spine resulting from the tumour I have there. Susan has become very adept at getting the chair in and out of the boot of the car, and pushing me around. I dare not be critical (I actually don't have anything to be critical of), because I'm sure she would leave me at the top of a hill without the brakes on (only joking of course). Really though, she has been very good and patient as my prime carer. Exercises for my right arm continue as well, to improve its mobility (hence I can now use both hands on the keyboard etc, instead of just my left hand as in earlier emails).

Anyway, over the past six weeks or so, with my increased mobility and improved wellbeing, I have had a number of "outings" with Susan, close friends and some of my Vietnam vet mates to various clubs, the Australian War Memorial and even a picnic down the lake (Wednesday). It has been great to be able to get out of the house and do things other than go to the hospital for some treatment or other. Having said that, on the 5th October I went to the hospital for one of my Zameta infusions, not getting home till after 5.00pm, only to be greeted by rellies and friends to celebrate my 65<sup>th</sup> Birthday. That was a real surprise and fortunately, I was well enough to enjoy everyone's company that night. Then on the 9th October Susan and I celebrated our 39th Wedding Anniversary with some friends at an Asian Restaurant, together with a bottle of Moet. So you can see, my general health is currently improving (slowly, but it's getting there). So while I'm able, I am out to make the most of it. After all, you never know when your time is up and Susan and I still have things to do and places to see.

So, what else have I been doing? I have never been a crossword fan, but I have discovered crosswords and they at least keep the ol'grey matter working. Also I have been reading everything from the history of the Australian Light Horse to adventures in the French Foreign Legion and now Jeremy Clarkson (of "Top Gear" fame). Between the reading, we have revamped our front garden, with me supervising and Susan and the boys doing the work (I should have done that 20 years ago) and now the next major job is to tidy up the back shed (I have reams of paperwork from when I finished work that I will now not need anymore, so I guess I can dump it all for recycling). Also, with the improved use of my right arm, I can now get into the office and try and get that into some sort of order at long last. It's amazing what six months of relative neglect can leave you with. We also have many hundreds of photographs that need to be scanned and stored digitally, so I guess I've got plenty to keep me busy for a while.

My next major review with the Haematologist is on 29th November, so I will give you all a "heads up" after then.
