ANZAC Day 2010

Every thing is going well with the arrangements for the reunion next year.

To date we have 43 booked in the resort cabins at Freespirit Resort and 6 in the caravan park section with 3 using private accommodation in Darwin. It is a good turnout and there are some who have yet to book. We will attach the lists of those who have booked and those who are yet to commit. If anyone knows of anybody who has indicated they would be going to Darwin and do not appear on any of the lists tell them to contact me a.s.a.p as I have got 3 cabins at the resort booked as spares.

As I have said before the availability of accommodation is limited in Darwin and we have been able to secure a good price from the Resort for the reunion...

Kate and I, along with Cappers and Joan travelled to Darwin last month and stayed at the Free Spirit Resort while catching up with Mick Clee and his wife Gail. The resort is great and it was everything we expected it to be and after having a meeting with the Manager we were happy with the arrangements that Mick was able to negotiate with them. It was a worthwhile trip as we were able to get a good idea of what is available in Darwin in the way of venues for the functions we will be having during the reunion. A big thanks goes to Mick as he has done a lot of groundwork for us and he was able to show us the options that could be suitable for the functions.

First will be the welcome function to be held on the Friday evening (23rd April 2010) There are two options that would be great and after we have received confirmation on the availability of either one, we will inform you of where we will be holding the welcome function.

Second function will be ANZAC Day.

There is a dawn service in Darwin and there are several service clubs who provide breakfast after the service and Mick will be talking to one of them before we get to Darwin and will be able to let us know what and where. The main March starts at 9.30 and only lasts about 20 – 30min maximum and it looks like we could be the biggest contingent in the march. Straight after the march we will be going to the Trailer Boat Club overlooking the harbour for the After March Function. This will be in the form of finger food and buy your own drinks over the bar. Before you go crook the bar prices are very reasonable so it won't cost an arm and a leg. Then, when ready, we return to Free Spirit for some R&R if needed or more drinks for the stayers.

The third function is the Battery Dinner which will be held on the 27th April 2010 and at the moment it looks good for the Senior NCOs / Senior Sailors Mess at Larakia Barracks which is again a great venue for this function but it is subject to Mick negotiating with the Mess Committee but after we had a look at it and speaking with the President of the Committee we are confident that we will be able to use their facilities.

He proceeds to work his way down the hut giving every one of them a serve and at the end of the hut announced that they were all to be on the parade ground at 2000 hours with their webbing correctly fitted. The rest of us were under the hut listening to this and we all went back to the warm Rec hut to witness events. At 2000 hours the poor buggers come out with webbing hanging off at all angles waiting to be inspected. Winter in Holsworthy can be very cold and after 30 minutes or so the first brave soles spat the dummy and went back to their hut and gradually the others did the same. The next day at Morning Parade we were lined up outside the end of our hut facing across the parade ground at the new arrivals, Jacko and Moto in the front rank were seen and it dawned on the lads that they had been set up. We ended up great mates in the end.
