Vale - Major Maurice (Morrie) Stanley

Morrie Stanley was one of the heroes of the bloody Battle of Long Tan, one of Australia's most intense encounters of the Vietnam War. The New Zealand Army Captain attached to Delta Company of 6RAR is widely acknowledged as having played a huge role in saving most of the 108 besieged Australian Army soldiers during the three-hour battle on 18/08/1966. He was the forward artillery officer (F.O.) with D. Coy. when they were attacked in a rubber plantation by a force of about 2500 Viet Cong who outnumbered them 23 to one. He stayed by the side of the company commander, Major Harry Smith, calling in some 3500 artillery rounds from the 18, 105mm L1A1 howitzers from 161 Field Battery (New Zealand), 103 Field Battery (Australia), 105 Field Battery (Australia) and the six 155mm M109 self-propelled howitzers from 2/35th Battalion (US Army) at Nui Dat some five kilometres away. He radioed in more than 61 artillery fire missions and corrections. The enemy force attacked in waves during a torrential downpour, almost overrunning the Australians.

Maintaining his calm amid the mayhem - "I had to overcome my dread that I would make a mistake" he recalled. Unable to see through the rain and mud exactly where the rounds of high explosive were falling, working entirely by radio communication with the forward platoons and the artillery units back at Nui Dat from a folded map, held in his hand, constantly wiping off the mud and running rainwater. This New Zealand officer was calling in every ounce of his experience and training. His rifle lay unattended beside him in the water despite the repeated reminders of his radio operator fellow New Zealander, Willy Walker, to keep it in his hand, as the Australian soldiers fought against overwhelming odds with limited ammunition. At times he ordered salvos from the batteries to within 30 metres of the D. Coy. lines. He also disregarded requests from Sergeant Bob Buick, who took command of 11 Platoon after his commander was killed, to bring down fire onto his position. The platoon had only 10 men left out of 28 and Buick was prepared to make the ultimate sacrifice because he thought they were about to be overrun. By the time the enemy disengaged they left 245 dead in the rubber plantation. The Australians lost 18 dead and 23 wounded. The toll would have been much higher had it not been for Captain Stanley's guns.

Maurice David Stanley was born on March 22, 1931 in Christchurch and grew up in Napier. His father was a drill master and Morrie became a prefect and regimental sergeant major in the school cadets. In 1949 he joined a special cadet unit in Wellington to complete his final two years at school and while there won a place at the Royal Military Academy, Duntroon. He was 19 when he sailed for Sydney for the four-year cadetship.

As a New Zealander, he had more to overcome than the average Australian cadet. It was demanded of him, as part of the tough initiation, that he sing *Waltzing Matilda*. But his Kiwi spirit would kick in and instead he would sing the New Zealand marching song *Maori Battalion*. "I received some attention for my impudence" he recalled, of what must have been stern punishment. But there was a silver. He met a young lady from Canberra, Alva, at a church function and they were engaged the day he graduated as a lieutenant in December 1953. They married six months later.

His army career progressed. He was among 150 soldiers sent to England for ceremonial duties (including guard duties at Buckingham Palace) and trained with the British Army.

Back home, in January 1966, he was ordered to prepare for a posting to South Vietnam as a replacement battery captain with 161 Battery Royal New Zealand Artillery, which was providing direct artillery support for the Australian's 1RAR. The unit was attached to the US Army's 173rd Brigade. After a relatively quiet start to his posting with 1RAR at the end of April 1966, the Battery moved to Vung Tau and then to Nui Dat in Phuoc Tuy Province where he joined 6RAR as its F.O.

The events in the plantation at Long Tan erupted less than four months later. Stanley 's actions that day earned him the military MBE for Valour and a U.S. Citation. Many consider he deserved a higher award.

After Vietnam, his postings included a four-year stint as a defence liaison officer in Melbourne. In all, he spent eight years in Australia. After he retired from the army with the rank of major in 1976 he worked in hospital administration in Auckland. In May 2010, Morrie Stanley along with his former radio operator at Long Tan, fellow New Zealander Willy Walker, were presented with the Australian Unit Citation for Gallantry (UCG) at a surprise service in New Zealand attended by his former Long Tan comrades Harry Smith, Bob Buick and Dave Sabben. In an unprecedented move, both the Australian Government and New Zealand governments fast tracked the offer from Australia of the Australian UCG to Morrie and Willy and within a few hours of receiving the offer, the New Zealand Prime Minister approved the presentation on Saturday 29th May 2010. Long Tan veteran Major Morrie Stanley (RTD), MBE passed away peacefully at his home in Campbells Bay, New Zealand. Morrie is survived by his wife, Alva, and sons Peter and Andrew. A third son, Donald, predeceased him. A true Hero. Rest in Peace old Warrior.
